Named Saahkómaapína, or "Boy Chief" by elders of the Siksika Nation, the site lies along a proposed NOVA Gas Transmission Ltd. pipeline route at Little Sandhill Creek.



In Alberta, the Historical Resources Act protects archaeological, historical and palaeontological sites and ensures they are preserved, studied and interpreted.




Artifacts recovered from the site include projectile points from bison hunting, and tools for cutting and scraping.

Trained archaeologists will be on hand to explain how the first North Americans lived. Learn how archaeologists interpret the stone tools (spear points, hide scrapers, knives), bones from animals that were hunted, remains of cooking fires, and other cultural items.

The "Boy Chief" site provides an opportunity to examine past lifestyles spanning much of the last 4,500 years.
